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ELEMENTS OF INTEREST FOR THE STUDY OF THIS COURSE

Importance of the Course: The relevance of the Greek language and culture has proved of paramount importance not only in the United Kingdom but also all over the countries where English is written and spoken in terms both of quantity as well as quality. Knowledge of Greek plays a pivotal role for English Studies, as it leads to 1) a better command of the vocabulary, the syntactical structures and the linguistic resources of the English language; 2) a better understanding of the main authors within the so called 'English' literature, who have recurred to, imitated, alluded, contested, and appropriated in all sorts of different ways the ancient Greek language and literature.

5. Knowledge of the main authors, plays and myths from the Ancient Greece with an influential role on the literature and culture of the English speaking countries.
