COMPETENCY ASSESSMENT

Criteria and assessment tools

At the end of the course, students should have fulfilled the following criteria:

1. Class Attendance and participation in Class: 10%
2. Offering either an Individual Speech or an “Audiovisual Project-Presentation” of a topic from the syllabus of the subject. The list of topics will be posted on the Blackboard of the subject (WebcT): 20 %
 - 2.1 Students who do not offer any of the formerly mentioned activities in class (Individual Speech or Audiovisual Project-Presentation) will miss 20 % of the Final mark of the whole Assessment of the Subject.

- 2.2 The presentation of either the Individual Speech or the Audiovisual Project-Presentation has to be in the classroom, offered to the teacher and the group of students. In due time, there will be an assigned chronogram with dates and times for the presentation of each student.
3. Submitting papers and assignments (Online Activities on WebcT): 20 %
- 3.1. Sending papers and assignments out of date will imply a loss of the respective 20 %.
4. Final Exam: 50 % of the whole Assessment. In order to pass the subject, the student has to reach at least a score of 5.0 out of 10 of the Final Exam.
